Benefits of attending...

First-class speakers

Each year the conference presents the opportunity to interact with an extensive range of speakers across the Transport Industry. In addition to this year's engaging plenaries which will include a keynote by Professor Peter Balázs, coordinator of the North Sea-Mediterranean EU Corridor, we are delighted to announce that the conference will be opened by the Irish Minister of Transport, Tourism and Sport, Shane Ross TD.

Thought-provoking research sessions

Research sessions are a key element of the conference, with its reputation being built on the important interaction and knowledge transfer between research, policy and practice. The conference focusses on drawing out the policy implications of research and not just concentrating on the design and operation of a model. Practitioners and policy makers are encouraged to relate their presentations to the research behind the implementation of schemes and policies.

The conference takes an open, participative approach to its programme. Members who join the programme committees vote to shape the contents of the conference itself, adapting it to the needs of the attendees accordingly. ETC focusses on remaining relevant to the essential transport issues of the day, meeting the needs of the current members. As the conference evolves, it looks to recruit a more diverse, inclusive and representative Europe wide membership.

Networking with international colleagues

The conference provides an excellent opportunity for all participants to engage with international transport experts and become part of a specialist association. Attendance at ETC allows different groups to collaborate with fellow professionals, encouraging discussions regarding what might be possible within their community.

Conference programme

Delegates can download the conference programme from the website and will be provided with a detailed conference guide in Dublin. Online access to papers is provided to delegates prior to the conference.

Digital archive

Conference papers, dating from 1996, are archived on the AET website, where they can be downloaded easily and permanently for the international transport community.

ETC 2018: What can you expect?

The conference attracts transport practitioners and researchers from all over Europe providing access to in-depth presentations on policy issues, best practice and research findings across the broad spectrum of transport.

The extensive range of topics and the multi-seminar approach makes ETC unique among transport conferences and it is well established as the premier event of its type. The conference programme covers supranational issues, national and local policy and the implementation of projects at a local level.

The conference presents a brilliant opportunity for networking and developing career-spanning professional relationships. Although sessions at the conference can be challenging in discussing matters of policy at the highest level, they can also provide good, basic education and training opportunities – it is truly a conference for all ages and all levels of experience.

As transport practitioners and researchers throughout Europe respond to the challenges of economic growth, social change, demographics and the need to become more sustainable, ETC provides a forum for the presentation of, and discussion on, solid and affordable responses.

Format of the conference

The duration of the conference is three days from Wednesday 10 to Friday 12 October. Optional social events are offered to delegates during the evenings and networking opportunities are available throughout.

ETC is a mix of plenary sessions, some debates and parallel workshop sessions. Each day, there will be a minimum of 9 concurrent streams, in sessions of 1.5 or 2 hours. Each session comprises between three and four papers presented in a themed seminar. The chair of each session ensures that there is ample time for discussion of papers and questions.



Booking details
